Where To Meet And Eat And Other Details:

If you are planning to attend the outing, please email the outing coordinator Sherri Ray so we will know who to expect and how many people we should try to get together. Several members have reservations at the Riverview RV Park. The RV Park has a small meeting room that they have so graciously agreed to let us use. The Riverview is located on the southwest side of the Hwy 281 bridge that crosses the Colorado River/Lake Marble Falls in downtown Marble Falls. We will meet there Friday night at 8 pm. to discuss fishing places and possibilities for Saturday. Please meet Saturday night for a "spread". The room has kitchen facilities for our use. The room is not huge, but unless we have a really large group it should serve us well.

Originally, there was a consensus that we should meet and eat at the Bluebonnet Café in downtown Marbles Falls. The "local celebrity" of cafes offers wonderful down home cooking I am told. I went there to try and work out a way for us to eat there as a group on Saturday night but they do not take reservations on Saturday nights. The place is not very large and they are extremely busy on weekends. Several members have stated they do not want to cook, so for those of you who care for a carry-out order from Bluebonnet, it will be available. We will discuss it Friday night, so if you're interested and ARE NOT going to be in on Friday night, email me at rsray@cvtv.net for more details about ordering. One cannot help but notice the absolutely beautiful pies that are available when you walk in the door.

A Few Details About Where To Fish (Other Places To Be Discussed Friday)

The Max Starkey dam is located on Max Starkey Rd just south of town on Highway 281. When on Max Starkey Rd. stay right and don't be surprised when the road becomes mostly a trail. There is a private access area with a small fee. I checked this out on the way home from Homer Martin and the

fee at the time was \$2 per person and \$5 per carload. Be prepared for a steep descent into this area to fish. There is a concrete railway, previously used to carry materials for the dam's construction, to get down to the water.

I am told it is possible that this area can be quite crowded during the bass run and there are other places to fish within short driving distance of Marble Falls. There is Inks Lake and dam (approx. 20/25 miles), the Llano River (approx. 30/35 miles), Long's Fish camp and other places in Kingsland (approx. 15/20 miles) and Colorado Bend State Park (approx. 40 miles) if you're interested, to name a few. Another point of interest close to Marble Falls is the Longhorn Cavern State Park if you're a cavern person.

What To Bring For Fishing

A 4-7 wt. flyrod and 7 foot leader with 5-7 lb. tippet . Streamer type minnow imitation flies such as Clouser minnows, Cypert Minnows and muddler minnows. White, gray, yellow, chartreuse and reds are popular colors. Hook sizes 2, 4, 6 and/or 8. Floating line is ok. Sinking line/full sinking line and split shot could possibly be advantageous. Practice casting with weighted flies might be a good idea if you aren't used to it. Longer casting strokes and open loops will prevent the weighted flies from landing in your cap or on your fishing buddy.

If you are looking for lodging other than RV spaces there are several hotels in the area:

WHITE BASS TIPS FROM CHARLIE CYPERT

On Saturday Feb. 1, 2003 Charlie Cypert presented a White Bass Seminar at the Orvis store in Austin. Charlie showed slides of his favorite white bass holes and some of the bass he has caught in previous years during white bass runs.

Every year in early spring, white bass, or sand bass as they are also known, leave the lakes and migrate upriver to find moving water in which to spawn. The exact timing of the annual white bass run depends upon the water temperature, but generally in Central Texas the main run lasts from March to mid-April. Charlie reported that as of early February, the bass were holding at about 10-12 feet. As air and water temperatures warm, the bass move progressively into shallower areas of the lakes and then up the rivers and into their tributaries. Often, the white bass are accompanied by stripers and hybrids, which can make for some very exciting fishing. The bass may travel as far as 40 miles upriver, or until they encounter a dam that stops their travel. The smaller ones (males) start the run while water temperatures are still in the 50's, and the females follow when water temperatures get into the 60's. The fish usually move through the shallows during the night and stack up in deep holes to rest and feed. After the spawn, in April-May, the fish will go back downriver to the lakes.

WHAT TO USE. Charlie suggests using a 6 wt. sinking line for deeper holes, with #10 -12 hooks for white bass, but if stripers are present you can go as big as #6-#4 hooks and 10-lb leader. For smaller fish, 4-5x tippet and small flies in white and gray work best in very clear water; in muddy water use black or chartreuse. He recommends 4-6lbs fluorocarbon tippet for white bass.



WHAT FLIES

The Cypert minnow is a favorite among white bass fishermen. You can find the recipe to make this wonder fly by logging on to <http://users2.ev1.net/~morger/Flyfishing/WarmWater/WPatterns/Baitfish/cyperts.htm> or just check out the website so you know just what to buy. Another favorite is the clouser minnow with bead chain eyes and marabou tails -- but he recommends that if the water is very clear, pull some of the hairs out of the fly to make it very sparse. Gray and white seems to be a favorite for white bass. Most anything that looks like a minnow will work. Early on the season, he uses a marabou minnow pattern, which will create a lot of action while just barely moving along the bottom. Use two or three short strips with lengthy pauses and let the current impart most of the action. As the water warms, white bass become more active and thus are more willing to take a faster-moving fly. When fish are active, Cypert switches to a sparsely tied streamer pattern, such as a skinny-water Clouser fished relatively fast. Also, toward the end of the run, once the fish have been up the river awhile, they will have eaten most of the larger minnows, so they switch from the larger forage to smaller minnows. That makes it necessary to drop down to a smaller streamer pattern towards the end of the migration.

PLACES TO GO

WHITE BASS AT REIMERS RANCH (PEDERNALES RIVER) -- UPDATE FROM MARTIN PURSCH, HEART OF THE HILLS FLYFISHERS

There are reports of white bass beginning to run up the local rivers. The wife and I drove Sunday to check out one report. Smaller male white bass have started their run up the Pedernales River out of Lake Travis. One place to fish this run is at the Reimer Ranch. To get to the Reimer Ranch, the directions (*from Fredericksburg*) are as follows: Drive to Johnson City. Turn left off 281 and drive North toward Marble Falls. After about 11 to 12 miles, you come to the small town of Round Mountain. Turn right on FM 962. At about the 7 to 8 mile mark you will cross Cypress Creek and come to Cypress Mill. Turn left to stay on FM 962. At the 6 to 7 mile mark you will cross the Pedernales River. From the bridge drive 1.4 miles. The Reimer Ranch gate is on the left. Pipe at the entrance is painted green. There are signs at the entrance but hard to see coming from this direction. From the gate follow the sign and main dirt road to the check in point at their home (about 2.6 miles). I talked to the lady living there (Mrs. Reimer?) and she reported the following: The river has been on a rise from our rains and is muddy. Before the rise, they were catching limits of small male white bass. Check the regulations for where you are fishing. Statewide the law is 10" min - daily bag 25. But, the best I can determine, the size and limit on this part of the river is 12" min - daily bag 25. (please note - I am not a lawyer and/or surveyor) She believes that in a day or two the river will be back down and will start to clear. She believes the larger females will then be in the river. I did not drive to the river's edge but we looked at it from a hill not far away. She says you will be able to wade the river or use a kayak or canoe. The river looks wide but not sure how wide until it goes down. She said the main deeper river bed is in about the middle of the river. When fishing for white bass, remember they will be hugging the bottom of the river bed so you have to fish close to the bottom. You may have to use a sink tip or full sinking line. They like minnows, so some of the more popular flies are white or silver with lots of flash. Chartreuse is also popular. Clousers - Chart/white and Cypert Minnows should work well. Reimers' normal hours are 7 AM -8 PM Thursday thru Sunday but she said from now till April 1 they will be open everyday. The cost is \$3.00 per person.

Editor's Note: The phone number to Reimer's Ranch is 512-264-1923. Reimers Ranch is approximately 25 miles southeast of Marble Falls via Hwy 281/FM 962.

Directions from Austin/Highway 71: Take 71 north/west, turn left at the light at RR 3238, (Hamilton Pool Road). There is an Exxon on the corner. It is 11-12 miles to Reimers. You will pass Hwy 12 at 6 miles or so, Reimers is about 5 miles past that. They have a sign by their drive.

Fish Kill Reported at Lake Granbury

A fish kill on Lake Granbury, possibly due to Golden Algae washed downstream from Possum Kingdom, is currently under investigation. So far the biologists estimate a loss of over 3 million fish in Lake Granbury with more dying every day. So far the water samples from Lake Whitney have been negative for Golden Algae, but with the rain predicted for the weekend, there will be water releases from Granbury, which will flush it down to Whitney.

Join us for a great weekend of fly fishing a fun contest in a wonderful river in the beautiful countryside. The Bud Priddy One Fly is sponsored by Alamo Fly Fishers and other South Texas Federation of Fly Fishers clubs. This informal contest takes place on the headwaters of the Nueces River in Camp Wood, TX. Prizes are awarded for catching the largest bass, largest perch (sunfish), and the most fish - but the catch is, you can only use one fly, all day. For details of last year's TWFF participation in the Bud Priddy see the May outing report on the Past Outings page of our website.

TWFF has booked the six cabins at Lost Canyon (<http://www.lostcanyon.org/>) for the weekend. Rooms are also available at local motels and RV/tent camping is available. See the Lodging section below for details. **Lost Canyon cabin reservations must be made by April 1 to Mary Rohrer.** Please do not call Lost Canyon for cabin reservations.

Outing Registration: Please inform Mary Rohrer of the names of all members of your party and where you will be staying. There is no registration fee for this outing.

What to Bring: Gear - hat, sunscreen, wading shoes, sandals or booties, rain suit, lightweight waders if desired, nylon or quick-dry clothes, sun gloves, warm clothes (for possible chilly nights), camera and film, binoculars (for great birding and wildlife), swimsuits, lunch, snacks and water bottles—enough for all-day fishing. Kayaks are useful for fishing Lake Nueces, home some of the clearest water you'll ever see as well as at least one 18" bass—but floating this stretch of the Nueces often requires more walking than paddling. Be prepared.

Suggested Flies and Lines: Bring your 5, 6 or 7 weight rod and tie on some heavy fluorocarbon or monofilament leader and tippet. Constance and Debi, (last year's biggest fish winner) suggest a 0X or 1X leader and tippet to be on the safe side. Flies such as clousers, jig head nymphs, wooly buggers and poppers can be used -but remember only "one fly" all day. You won't need a sinking line, just use your regular weight forward floating fly line.

Food: Bring food for dinner for Friday night, breakfast/lunch for Saturday, and breakfast/lunch for Sunday. Restaurants are also available in Camp Wood. Saturday night's dinner is provided as part of the entry fee for the contest.

Schedule of Events:

Friday: 7 pm Welcome gathering at Lost Canyon

Saturday: 7-8:30 am Bud Priddy One Fly Contest Registration at Lindbergh Park in Camp Wood (\$15 entry fee includes buffet TexMex dinner at Casa Falcone at 6 pm, raffle ticket for great door prizes, a map, measuring tape, pencil & zip lock bag).

Sunday: Brief business meeting Sunday am, time TBA. You are on your own for fishing or enjoying the resort.

Lodging Information

Lost Canyon Facilities: Each kitchen is fully equipped with pots, pans, utensils, coffee maker and microwave. Ice is not available on premises. Smoking is not permitted in buildings. This facility covers 680 acres, including a crystal clear creek and two large ponds, one for boating and fishing, the other for swimming, beyond which are hills, draws, pastures for hiking amidst abundant wildlife and great birding. A barn has been converted into a well-lit and comfortable library that holds over 2,000 books and current periodicals. In addition, there is a tennis court, basketball court, volleyball net and a canoe. See the Lost Canyon website (<http://www.lostcanyon.org/>) for additional information.

Lost Canyon Check In is available after 1 p.m. on Friday. Check Out is by 6 p.m. on Sunday.

Directions from San Antonio: (2.5 hours) Take Hwy. 90 to Uvalde. Go north from there on Hwy 55 (this involves a right turn at the town square, then a left turn at the north edge of town just after the railroad overpass). Take Hwy 55 through Camp Wood to Barksdale, where the only right turn you can make is County Road 211. Take the County Road 211 (also known as Dry Creek Road) 4 miles to resort gate on the left and has a sign for resort. Lost Canyon is 3.5 hours from Austin. Check www.lostcanyon.org/directions.htm for map and directions.

Preliminary Announcement

TWFF will travel to Junction, Texas to fish the spring-fed South Llano River, which is home to native Guadalupe Bass and Rio Grande Perch as well as largemouth bass, sunfish, catfish, and other species. Outing headquarters will be Morgan Shady Park (<http://www.morganshadypark.com/>), located on the banks of the South Llano as the river pools to form a small lake in downtown Junction. With its grassy banks and huge pecan trees, the privately owned Morgan Shady Park is an ideal spot for summer camping in the Hill Country. Flowing out of the “Land of 1100 Springs,” the South Llano maintains an adequate flow and the lake waters remain cool and refreshing even in the middle of our long, hot summers.

TWFF has reserved *The Patio* at Morgan Shady Park, which will provide a joint cooking and dining area and will accommodate 6-8 tents. The park also has dedicated RV spots with electrical hookups. For those who prefer indoor accommodations, Junction has many moderately priced motels within a 10-minute drive of Morgan Shady Park.

Ed Lowe of Dallas’s Celebration Restaurant will provide a catered grilled chicken dinner on Saturday evening, to allow us to have a full day of leisurely float fishing from South Llano River State Park to Morgan Shady Park. This six-mile stretch of river has only small rapids and is suitable for novice paddlers. If you prefer to forego the river trip, there is also wadefishing and bank fishing at Morgan Shady Park as well as at the South Llano State Park and at a river crossing near the Texas Tech campus (about 2 miles upstream of Morgan Shady Park, 10-15 minutes by car).

Guadalupe Update. Scott Graham reports (2/2/03) "Although the river clean up is still in full swing, the Guadalupe is fishing pretty good. Last week I had two clients that hooked about eighty trout between them, most days we're hooking between 15 and 30 fish per person. We have landed a few large males up to about 17 inches and a couple of females to 21 inches. The average size is about 11-13 inches. The weather has been a little funky with some mornings that we're having to pick the ice out of the rod guides and other days we're fishing in short sleeves. The water temperature has been between 42 and 50°.

Numerous other cabins and tent/RV campgrounds are located in the vicinity. For a listing, see the Beavers Bend State Park web site. (Click on Park Lodging and Dining/ Beaver Bend Cabins/ Rates; the table at the bottom of the page has contact information for other cabins in the area.)

Whip-poor-will has 18 rental cabins with rates ranging from \$55 to \$155. Cabins are available now (mid-February) – but please **make your reservations soon because the cabins will book up quickly**. (Whip-poor-will cabin reservations can be cancelled without penalty up until 7 days before your reservation date.) All cabins are air conditioned, and have fully equipped kitchenettes, charcoal grills, country decor, and cable TV. Reservations can be made by phone (580-494-6476) using Master Card/Visa, American Express, or Discover cards. **Please make your reservations directly with Whip-poor-will or the resort/campground of your choice**. Whip-poor-will has a restaurant on site (Steaks/Italian) for those who do not want to cook.

RV/Tent Camping is available at Beavers Bend State Park (no reservation required) as well as the nearby Lake Pines (\$17/ night for full hook ups). Lake Pines is approx. 5 miles from Whipoorwill, and is located approx. 1-2 miles outside of the park just past the turn on the park road. Tel. 580-494-6464 (no website).

Beavers Bend State Park

Two nearby fly shops are very helpful with fly information, fishing places etc--one fly shop is located on the highway at the entrance to the park; the other shop is in the park on the river. The park has several beautiful locations for wade fishing with convenient parking nearby, and good kayaking. The park also has a park store and a restaurant with a really good breakfast for your convenience. Located adjacent to the restaurant is a wildlife rescue shelter where injured wild animals are being nurtured back to health. For the non-fishers, Beavers Bend is also popular for eagle watching and golf.

Fishing License. You will need a temporary (3-day or 7-day) Oklahoma Fishing License, which can be purchased at the park office of Beavers Bend State Park.
