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TWFF Business Report

With the auctions and raffles behind us, we find ourselves in very good financial shape. We have raised enough money, specifically for Casting for Recovery, to sponsor one participant for next spring's Texas retreat. We have met our budget goals set at the beginning of the year and can now concentrate on another important business aspect of our organization.

We have been fortunate to have Audrey Ambrose, Mary Rohrer, and Lavene Jones dedicate two years of service as officers of TWFF. Their terms are coming to an end and it is time to nominate candidates to fill their positions. Additionally, Linda Love and Pamela Vestal have given one year of service as trustees of TWFF, and we need two new trustees to serve a one year term.

Sheila Hood, Linda Love, and Sheila Anderson have formed a committee and will actively seek volunteers to accept nominations for the vacating officer positions. We are fortunate that Mary Rohrer will accept the nomination for another term as Treasurer. We need volunteers to be nominated for 1st Vice President, Secretary, and two trustees. The job descriptions follow.

First Vice President (Speakers, Raffles & Banquets): The Vice President plans and coordinates Speakers, Raffles, and Banquets. At the request of the President or in the President's absence, the Vice-President may perform the duties of the President.

Galveston Salt Water Trip Report September 2005

The Texas Women Fly Fishers took Galveston by storm just one week before Hurricane Rita. Talk about good timing! Our third salt water adventure brought us to Galveston for a first class mullet mixer, the continuation of our fly rod raffle and silent auction, a great day for fishing, and a fabulous dinner at Gaido's Family Restaurant.

Kimberly Gaido and Ellen Matthews hosted a delicious shrimp boil at the Gaido family home facing Galveston's West Bay. Sarah served up the best jalapeno poppers and potatoes to accompany the main dish. There was an assortment of other wonderful side dishes, too. So many auction items were displayed for round one of competitive bidding. Stacy Trimble offered a double haul clinic that many women took part in. Hauling is a method used to increase the distance the line travels during the false cast – a very good skill to develop for salt water fly fishing.

We were divided into three groups, one for each guide hired to lead us. Unfortunately, one of the guides cancelled at the last minute, so the most experienced fisher women and paddlers planned to set out with Kimberly and Stacy sans hired guide. The groups gathered to discuss the details of their plans to meet Saturday morning.

Kimberly drew for door prizes and many in attendance went home with little extras. The raffle drawing was so exciting. Lavene Jones won the 4-piece, 5 weight Sage with case donated by Sportsman's Finest in Austin. And, Jim Stephenson won the 4 piece, 8 wt Temple Fork Outfitters rod with case donated by Mountain River Fly Shop in Cotter, Arkansas. Congratulations, Lavene and Jim!

Saturday morning the weather was perfect and three groups set off in different directions. The fish were so active, darting around the shallow water bay as the kayakers entered their domain. The water was a little off color, so we had to blind cast for the fish. Robert Anderson caught the largest red fish at 19", Stacy Trimble took the honors for trout, and

Linda Love caught a good size flounder. They would all receive a prize for their catch later that evening at dinner. For the most part not many people caught fish, however we all got the opportunity to hone our casting skills and improve our paddling abilities. All the practice will pay off at future salt water outings. Stealth is an essential element of successful salt water fly fishing from a kayak, it comes with practice.

Saturday evening we met at Gaido's for seafood dinner. A very nice private room was reserved for us. We continued our auction throughout dinner, with a final dash for last minute bids when dessert was served. Kimberly introduced a story telling contest. Several women shared their adventures of the day, and a prize was awarded to Kerri Stephenson for her "Nemo" story. As you may imagine, she caught a very tiny fish – unknowingly. She thought the metal spoons were difficult to cast, only to discover she had a tiny fish on and didn't know it.

We conducted our business meeting after dinner so we could fish on Sunday morning without interruption. This was one of our very best outings to date. Galveston is a beautiful place, and there are so many places in the back bays to fish in kayaks. Hopefully we can return next year and catch more fish! November 2005: TROUT FISHING ON THE LOWER MOUNTAIN FORK RIVER

Last trip for 2005!

TWFF will travel to southeast Oklahoma over November 4th – 6th to fish for brown and rainbow trout in the stocked waters of the Lower Mountain Fork River at Beavers Bend Oklahoma State Park and Resort, near Broken Bow, OK. Broken Bow is approximately 200 miles northeast of Dallas.

The Lower Mountain Fork flows south out of Broken Bow Reservoir. This tailwater is the most noted year-round trout fishery in the state. Brown and rainbow trout are stocked regularly and may be found throughout the stream and its tributaries. The designated trout area includes a 12-mile reach of the Lower Mountain Fork River extending from Broken Bow Dam downstream to U.S. Highway 70 bridge. About 5 miles of this designated trout stream lies within Beavers Bend State Park, which offers excellent fishing access.

Spillway Creek is a tributary of the Lower Mountain Fork River that is a part of the designated trout area. When you hike along Spillway Creek you feel as if you are in a Rocky Mountain stream. This 1 ½ mile stretch is the first section of the 12 mile designated trout stream and is one of the most popular fishing areas on the Lower Mountain Fork River. Several of our members have enjoyed successful trout fishing in this area. Several fish habitat structures have been installed throughout this section of stream to improve fishing quality and angler success. Trout are stocked near these structures, providing excellent places for angler to begin their trout fishing adventures. Habitat structures include boulder clusters, rock weirs and veins and medium stage check dams. These improvement areas are being stocked with trout on a regular basis to make your fishing better. A state record 9 pound 12.8 ounce brown trout was caught January 13, 2003 from Zone II of the Lower Mountain fork River.

Below Beavers Bend State Park there are public access points at the Regulation Dam and Presbyterian Falls as well as a fee access site located near the Highway 70 bridge. You will need a map and good instructions to get to Presbyterian Falls. Both of these places are more difficult to fish than Spillway Creek. If you have felt sole wading shoes with cleats, they will be very helpful as these rocks are extremely slick. Some guides will not even take you here without them. You must at least have felt soles. Be sure to bring your wading staff and keep it handy. Rob will give you more instruction concerning safety in these areas.

TWFF Outing Headquarters will be at Whip-Poor-Will Resort (<http://www.texhillcntry.com/whippoorwill/>), located 6 miles from Beavers Bend State Park (<http://www.beaversbend.com>) adjacent to the Ouachita National Forest.

Numerous other cabins and tent/RV campgrounds are located in the vicinity. For a listing of these and additional information about the area including other activities, see the [Beavers Bend Oklahoma State Park and Resort](#) web site.

Whip-Poor-Will Resort has 18 rental cabins that we can rent at last year's rates. Make certain you tell Cathy you are reserving for the TWFF outing to get the special rates. **Make your reservations soon because the cabins will book up quickly.**

(Whip-poor-will cabin reservations can be cancelled without penalty up until 7 days before your reservation date.) All cabins are air conditioned, and have fully equipped kitchenettes, charcoal grills, country decor, and cable TV.

Reservations can be made by phone (580-494-6476) using Master Card/Visa, American Express, or Discover cards.

Please make your reservations directly with Whip-poor-will or the resort/campground of your choice. Send an email to Linda Love when your reservations are confirmed, she needs a head count of persons attending.

RV/Tent Camping is available at Beavers Bend State Park – (the park will fill up quickly and there are no guarantees that sites will be available for a Friday arrival during a busy time of year.) as well as the nearby Lake Pines (\$17/ night for full hook ups). Lake Pines is approx. 5 miles from Whip-poor-will, and is located approx. 1-2 miles outside of the park just past the turn on the park road. Tel. 580-494-6464 (no website).

Beavers Bend State Park

The park has several beautiful locations for wade fishing with convenient parking nearby. The park also has a park store and a restaurant with a really good breakfast for your convenience. There is also a great museum there telling some of the history of this area.

Plan on attending the Mullet Mixer at Linda Love's Cabin #10 on Friday night at 7:00. We will probably head out fishing early Saturday morning around 8:00 with a stop by the local fly shops and the State Park to purchase fishing licenses (if you do not already have them) and get maps. The area is best for wading. Kayaks can be used in some locations but not necessary for the best fishing. Plan on going out to eat on Saturday night at 7:00 at a restaurant near by. Then, more fishing on Sunday with meals on your on that night.

Remember waders and long johns. The water is cold year round but the air will be cold also. This is best time of year for trout fishing in this area. So be prepared to reel in lots of fish but also to be patient and courteous as the streams will most likely be filled with other fishers.

What to Bring:

Rod size: Spillway Creek 5-6 weight. You can also use 3-4 weight fly rod for a bit more action with smaller fish. (Pam had good action on #3 weight rod early this year)

Flies:

Olive wooly bugger, with/without bead head size 8-10. Black/olive also good.

Streamers: white or silver & white minnow style and white Zonker #6 long

Nymphs: Prince nymph #16; Pheasant tail, with/without bead #14-16. Flash back OK too. Gold rib hares ear #14-16.

Brassie and Copper John #14-16

Red fox squirrel tail size #14-16.

Midge - red, pearl, #20-22. Soft hackle in orange & olive are good colors.

Dry fly: Parachute Adams 14-16; Caddis in tan or gray #12-14. Blue wing olive #18.

San Juan worm - tan #12-14.

There are 2 fly shops in this area. One is The Beaver Bend Fly Shop located in the park and the other is the Three Rivers Fly Shop, 3rivers@pine-net.com, phone 580.494.6115, located near the Whip-Poor-Will cabins. You can obtain your license there or you can get it online at their web site prior to arrival. Sid at The Fly Shop is very helpful and is well stocked with flies.

Rob Woodruff will present a program Friday evening at the mullet mixer beginning around 7 PM (exact time will be provided later), including orientation to Beaver Bend OK. fishing, how to read the water, fishing different kinds of water, flies to use, technique and where to fish.

Saturday morning he will place us in strategic fishing spots, tweak the skills of those who are interested, i.e., mending the line, etc., and help with casting presentation. He will rotate to each group during the day to help as needed. Those with previous experience here may want less help than those who are new to the area. Trout fishing is a bit different than bass and pan fish and he will help us learn to fish for trout. Rob will tell us regulations regarding size, catch and release, etc.

Information regarding our guide:

Rob woodruff is a full-time licensed fly fishing guide. He holds a B.S. in Entomology from Texas A & M and has over 30 years fly fishing experience. He has been featured twice on ESPN's Fly Fishing America. Rob's techniques and flies have appeared in magazines such as Fly Rod & Reel, Warmwater Flyfishing, Fly Fishing and Tying Journal, Outdoor World, Flyfisher, Texas Fish and Game, Bassmaster and Southwest Fly Fishing. Rob hosts Salmon and Trout trips to the remote and beautiful Chilcotin district of British Columbia every July and September. He also guides on the fabulous Lake Fork, where he lives, and where you can fish for lunker bass. Also guides on Lake Monticello, Texas which is a power plant lake and on Glass Lake, Texas, a private access 73 acre lake. His rates are most reasonable [check out his web site]. We will be staying at the Summit Vacation Resort that is located at Canyon Lake on River Road between the 3rd & 4th River Crossings. Reservations will be made and fees paid in advance to Sheila Hood or her designee. Checks made payable to THE SUMMIT and mailed to Sheila Hood at P. O. Box 219 Kempner, TX 76539 will secure your reservation. If you need to contact Shelia, you can call her at 512-734-5086 or email her at sahood1@earthlink.net. Cabins will be assigned in the order fees are received GET YOUR RESERVATION IN QUICKLY. Please do not contact the Summit individually.

There are seven smaller cabins with queen & one bunk bed, linens included, shower, and kitchenette with essentials. The fee for cabins due at time of reservation is \$49.00 per night tax included.

There are 5 larger cabins with a queen sleeper sofa, (2) bunks, and loft with double bed, linens included, shower, and kitchenette with essentials. The fee for cabins due at time of reservation is \$59.00 per night tax included.

Currently, we still have 7 smaller cabins and 5 larger cabins available along with RV pads. But, don't wait too long or those cabins will be snatched up. A couple of people are looking for roommates – so do not hesitate to sign up if your party can't fill up an entire cabin. I will work to help everyone find a roommate. There is also other lodging available near the river – but soon there will be no vacancies – this is a popular season for us fly fishers.

RV spaces are \$15.00 per night tax included.

What to Bring

Bring a light weight fly rod (4 to 6 weight); reel with weight forward fly line to match your rod; 5x leader & 5x tippet; split shot; strike indicators; small nymphs (flies in size 22); wading boots; waders and very warm clothes. If you have neoprene waders and felt sole boots that will be fine. If you have Gortex waders and felt sole boots, wear Polartec or long underwear. You will need boots and waders! You will need very warm clothes. Please make sure you have your fishing license.

Friday 7:30 PM

Join your fellow Texas Women Fly Fishers at the Summit Clubhouse for the 'Mullet Mixer'.

Saturday

Tie flies at the Clubhouse or fish the Guadalupe at your leisure. Do not wade fish if the flow is above 300 cfs. Join TWFF at 7:00 PM at the Summit Clubhouse for a catered BBQ dinner and swap tales of the day. A \$8.50 per person fee should be mailed with your cabin reservation for the catered BBQ - separate check made out to TWFF or cash.

Summary

Mail Reservation Fee of \$49.00 per night for a small Cabin, \$59.00 per night for a larger Cabin, or \$15.00 per night for RV spaces. Checks made out to the Summit. Mail to Sheila Hood or designee.

Include names of persons staying in the cabin. This is a gated resort. The office is open 24 hours a day, they will have your name and cabin assignment. You will be given a code for the electronic gate.

Seminars and classes begin at 9:00am, March 4, 2006 as the Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center hosts Fly Fish Texas - an all day fly fishing festival. Our 6th annual show, it just keeps getting bigger and better each year. Until 4:00pm, fly fishing enthusiasts from beginner to expert gather at this great Texas Parks and Wildlife facility to share skills and stories about this exciting outdoor sport offering a variety of activities for all levels of anglers. Learn to cast the fly and then

actually fish for rainbow trout, discover where to fly fish in Texas, check out the latest gear and even kayaking.

Interactive seminars, classes and demonstrations led by Texas fly fishing professionals will highlight the show. Day long activities will include:

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- ✚ A fly tier's round table (demonstrations of tying all types of flies)
 - ✚ Fly action/fish pursuit demonstrations (actual fish taking the fly right before you eyes)
 - ✚ Casting lessons (learn to cast or improve on what you know)
 - ✚ Fishing for rainbow trout (we furnish the rods and flies)
 - ✚ Basic Flyfisher Classes (kids 12 and up are introduced to fly tackle, rods, reels, flies, proper casting techniques, aquatic habitat, safety and ethics)
 - ✚ Intermediate Flyfisher Classes (kids & adults identify fish, fish habitats, tie fly fishing knots and flies, learn fishing regulations, proper fish handling and safely perform 4-part casting)
 - ✚ Product demonstrations (vendors with their goodies)

All these Fly Fish Texas activities are available at regular admission rates to TFFC: adults \$5.50, seniors 65 and over \$4.50, children 4-12 \$3.50.

The Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center is an innovative aquatic nature center and hatchery complex operated by Texas Parks and Wildlife located 4 miles east of Athens, TX on FM 2495. The Center is open to the public Tue-Sat from 9am-4pm and Sunday 1-4pm. Call 903-676-2277 or go on-line at www.tpwd.state.tx.us and click on fishing.

Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center is a unique facility which includes a 23,000 square foot visitor's center, 300,000 gallons of aquaria and a state-of-the-art hatchery with 45 rearing ponds covering 38 surface acres and is home to the ShareLunker and Angler Recognition Awards Programs. A new half mile long fly fishing stream meanders through and around several wetlands ponds before it meets a one-acre wadeable wetlands pond at the rear of the property. Kayaking and wade fishing will be done in this shallow pond. Other shorter bass streams join the main stream and all will possibly be stocked with bream, bass and/or trout for this event. A new fly fishing pavilion will be available. This promises to make this Center the envy of all Texans and fly fishers in the future.
